

TEEN CLASSES AT HARVEY MILK

Registration for Rec & Park's fall activities, programs, and classes is underway. 23 different classes will be offered at the Harvey Milk Center for the Arts this fall, including seven courses for teenagers: Portfolio Development Workshop, Teen Audio Lab, Theater Tech with YPTMTC, Tween Art Exploration, Young People's Teen Musical Theater Company Theater, and, Zines for Teens.



Teen Audio Lab will give teens a chance to explore audio concepts in a way they can easily understand. Students will explore making beats, song structure, basics of production, and how to upload their songs to different streaming services. Students will learn the basics of Ableton Live, which is software used by working professionals all over the world. LEARN INKJET PRINTING, DARKROOM ESSENTIALS

Take your images off the screen and into the printed form! Introduction to Inkjet Printing will be offered on Wednesdays, 5-8:30 p.m. from October 24-November 14.will cover best practices in shooting, editing, preparing images for print, and archival storage methods. The class will utilize the Epson Stylus Pro, an inkjet printer capable of

delivering stunning professional-quality prints on multiple types of media. Passing familiarity with Adobe Photoshop and/or Lightroom are highly recommended. Please bring a laptop with current version of Adobe Photoshop or Lightroom and thumb drive. This class will supply (2) 8 x 10 inch prints. Should students wish to print more, a materials fee will be charged according to the size and number of prints created.

Darkroom Essentials & Processes is an introductory class that covers all of the key basics in Black and White Darkroom printing. Learn the essential steps and key processes to get you on your way to printing your images! Students will gain the techniques to grow in skill and confidence. UNCANNY BEAUTY PHOTO SHOW CLOSES OCTOBER 21

Uncanny Beauty, an exhibition of contemporary fine art photography by 18 members of the Bay Area Photographers Collective continues through October 21. Curator Emmanuelle Namont says, "These photographs offer a fresh and captivating vision of life's strange, eerie and unique beauty."

MAINTENANCE UPDATE







Friends of Duboce Park met with Michelle Pallavicini, Park Services Manager, in September to get an update on various maintenance issues in the park and the responses we got are very encouraging.

Signage. Many of the signs and stencils are very worn and difficult to read. Pallavicini said that Duboce Park is on the list for replacement signs this fall. She also has submitted work orders to repaint the stencils to remind people that dogs are not allowed in the People Only Area (Upper Lawn) and are required to be on leash on the hill behind the bulletin board. We also requested a band of color around the People Only area as a reminder.

Benches. We can always use additional benches. Benches from Boedekker Park were added around the Potomac entry circle but there is still a need for more.

Garbage cans. Almost all of the garbage cans in Duboce Park are the plastic bins provided by Recology. We would love to see those cans replaced with something more modern and attractive, similar to the ones at Dolores Park. Pallavicini said Rec & Park will look into something that is suitable for Duboce.

Turf conditions. There are many bare, worn, and brown spots on all of Duboce Park Lawns. Pallavicini said that the recent sod replacement in the Dog Play Area just could not handle the impact of so many dogs so quickly. Urine, digging, and dog owners loitering in specific areas is the cause for some of the failure. The gardener regularly aerates and adds seed to many worn areas.

Playground resurfacing. We have been asking for repairs to the playground and YPA for years and finally we received some good news on the playground resurfacing. We are on this next round of repairs and bids have just gone out for the work.

Water fountain. The fountain near the Pierce St. entrance is no longer operating. The bottom of the unit has corroded and there is a leak underneath it. A new fountain is on order.

The ongoing India Basin Waterfront Park project in San Francisco's Bayview-Hunters Point neighborhood will receive \$5.1 million through a grant from the California State Coastal Conservancy to improve public access, and further habitat restoration and climate resilience efforts. The future 10-acre waterfront park is currently under construction. Once complete, it will seamlessly combine the historical former ship-building site at 900 Innes Ave. with India Basin Shoreline Park, which will also undergo improvements. The final product will create a spacious park in the city's southeastern neighborhood, featuring shore access, sports courts, gathering spaces, multi-use trails, and much more.





REMEMBERING SENATOR FEINSTEIN

We were saddened to hear of the recent passing of Senator Dianne Feinstein. While much of the focus remains on her legacy as a trailblazer who led San Francisco out of a dark time before rising to the national stage, we also remember her as a champion for San Francisco's parks. She opened and dedicated Sgt. John Macaulay Park and Mission Recreation Center, renamed Central City Park for Father Alfred Boeddeker, and much more.

COYOTE DISPERAL SEASON BEGINS

As we move from summer to fall coyotes are beginning their seasonal shift from denning to dispersal. During dispersal, young coyotes are likely to be more visible across San Francisco as they roam through neighborhoods, parks, and green spaces searching for denning sites. While these sightings can be thrilling, it's important to



remember that coyotes are wild animals. Here are some tips to ensure safe coexistence with

our natural neighbors:

- Keep dogs leashed and cats indoors. While rare, small dogs and cats can be viewed as prey. Keep both your pet and coyotes safe by staying vigilant.
- Do not approach coyotes, and instead admire them from a distance. If a coyote approaches you, pick up small children or pets, be loud and retreat slowly from the area.

If you encounter a coyote or see someone putting out food for a coyote, report it to Animal Care and Control (ACC) at (415) 554-9400, or by email at ACC@sfgov.org. This allows a better understand of coyote activity across the city and allows us to focus our coyote coexistence outreach in hotspot neighborhoods.
