DOGFEST BIG SUCCESS



T-SHIRT CONTEST FOR 125TH ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATION



HARVEY MILK SUMMER CAMPS

Does your child love to make art all day long? Then this is the camp for them! The Harvey Milk Summer Camps are visual and performing arts camps. Rec & Park offers intensive art-making and performing where campers ages 7 to 11 can explore and develop their artistic abilities in visual and digital art, storytelling, dance, or theatre, led by art specialists.

Projects focus on multi-step processes and challenge fine motor skills.

Performing arts will include movement and theatrical components. Students must participate in multiple daily classes.

Two one-week courses are being offered, beginning on June 9 and August 4. Three two-week courses start on June 16, July 7, and July 21. ECHOES OF RESILINCE: RECLAIMING HISTORY PHOTO SHOW

Echoes of Resilience: Reclaiming
History presents a powerful exhibition
featuring the work of Bay Area
photographers Harvey Castro and Izzi
Valencia. Their photography documents



the enduring spirit of communities facing climate disasters, cultural preservation, and the dignity of labor often overlooked in mainstream narratives.

Harvey Castro's "Los Olvidados" series captures the profound impact of natural disasters on marginalized populations. His photographs from



Guatemala and Puerto Rico vividly depict communities in the aftermath of environmental catastrophes, highlighting their perseverance and the critical need for ecological accountability.

Izzi Valencia's work focuses on the unification and organization efforts of Maya Mam, Mixteca, Chatino, Wixárica, and Nahua communities. Through his lens, he portrays the strength and solidarity of these groups as they strive to preserve their cultural heritage and rights amidst external pressure.

This exhibition offers an intimate look into the lives of people overcoming adversity, emphasizing their strength and solidarity. Through the eyes of two artists deeply connected to their roots, visitors are invited to engage with stories of resistance in existence.

MATTING, FRAMING, PRESENTING YOUR PHOTOS

Learn from a fine art photographer the easy methods and tools for matting and framing your work, including preparing your work form presentation and finding affordable ways to enhance your images. This one-day workshop is on Saturday, May 17, 11 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. and will include a hands-on instruction and demonstration.

Students can bring examples of their work for the demonstration. Photo Center Orientation is not required for this class, but it is required if a student wishes to come to the Photo Center outside the workshop to develop film on their own and/or print their own photos in the Darkroom.

COYOTE PUP REARING SEASON

Coyotes are normally shy animals and not known to be aggressive, but they will exhibit assertive behavior when threatened or protecting pups. During pup rearing season, from April to August, it is not unusual for coyotes to



be protective of the area near their den. During this time, walk dogs on leashes, especially during pup rearing season. Pick up your small dog if you see a coyote and don't let pets roam. Urban coyotes are familiar with the sights, sounds and smells associated with City, and often show little fear of people. Seeing coyotes during the daytime is not unusual.

San Francisco Animal Care and Control advises keeping dogs on leash and cats indoors. Coyotes see smaller animals as prey, and do not know the difference between small wildlife and small pets. Outdoor cats can be hit by cars, attacked by loose dogs, become lost, and can be preyed upon by coyotes. Please keep them safe indoors.

Call 911 immediately if there is a crime in progress or any other emergency that requires a police, fire, or medical

response. If a situation requires the police, but does not need an immediate response, call (415) 553-0123. Examples of non-emergency situations include noise complaints, suspicious activities, or a homeless/nuisance- related issues. If there is a problem in the park that is not an emergency, call the Park Rangers

at (415) 242-6390. Use this number for park code violations, such as noise, dogs in the People Only Area, and permit violations. Park Rangers only respond to non-emergency calls. In 2003, there were just 15 rangers but there are now 53 on their staff.
