

HOLIDAY CRAFT FAIR BIG SUCCESS

The annual Holiday Craft Fair returned to the Harvey Milk Center for the Arts on Sunday, December 15. 117 vendors submitted applications (compared to 93 last year), but there was only room to showcase 32.

This year's Fair attracted the largest number of shoppers of any previous Craft Fair to date. As evidence, Facility Coordinator Robby Roller said there was enough apple cider to last the entire event last year, but this year, they ran out at 2 p.m., even with two additional bottles of cider.

BASIC BLACK & WHITE FILM DEVELOPMENT

Learn the basics of black and white film development. In this quick workshop students will be taught how to properly process their black and white film. 35mm and 120 film development will all be explained. Students must bring in a black and white roll of film ready for development.

The class is being offered five times this Winter, with classes starting on January 23, January 31, February 1, February 28, and March 8.

There are no prerequisites and beginners are encouraged to sign-up. No class time will be spent in the darkroom and color film

LANA Z CAPLAN PHOTO SHOW JANUARY 25

The opening reception for *Oceano – for seven generations*, featuring photos by Lana Z Caplan, is this Saturday, January 25, 2 to 5 p.m. Edward Weston's iconic modernist images made the Oceano Dunes famous for photographers. Lana Z Caplan's project Oceano (for seven generations) tells the story of the Oceano Dunes through the dunes' successive inhabitants, while interrogating photographic history and convention.



Through photographs, video and text, *Oceano -for seven generations* ultimately aims to question legacies of colonization, media history, and the politics of land use – charging this cultural landscape with significance far beyond the Oceano Dunes.

Photographer and filmmaker Lana Z Caplan makes conceptual research and history-based projects that focus on environmental and social justice topics. Her recent photographic monograph, *Oceano -for seven generations* published by Kehrer Verlag, is in the collection of museums including Los Angeles County Museum of Art, The Getty Museum, Museum of Fine Arts Boston and The Cleveland Museum of Art.

MAINTENANCE SCORES FOR DUBOCE PARK

The city's Controller's Office partners with the Recreation and Parks to evaluate the condition of San Francisco's parks. Staff members evaluate the maintenance of each park every three months, and the results of these evaluations are included in reports and dashboards on the Controller's Office website. RPD uses these results to improve park conditions.

The citywide average yearly park score in 2024 is 91%, the same as in 2023. The average score is also above the minimum goal of 85%, which RPD establishes as the benchmark for a well-maintained park. More than 85% of the 171 parks meet or exceed this threshold, meaning that more than four-fifths of parks across the City are well-maintained.

The top nine scores were either 98% or 99%; the lowest eight scores ranged from 69-77%. Duboce Park's overall score last year was 96%, compared to 89% in FY 2022 and 90% in FY 2023. Here's how individual features in Duboce Park scored in 2024:

COYOTE ALERT

More than 600 coyote sightings were reported to San Francisco Animal Care and Control so far last year. More reports of coyotes were filed through October of last year, a 50% increase over previous years. During the wintertime mating season, encounters may increase as coyotes seek out mates and search for dens. Come spring, protective adult coyotes will be on high alert for any reason or dog they view as a threat to their pups.



Coyotes have repopulated the city in recent decades, and dens have sprung up in people's yards, according to Rec and Park. An estimated 100 coyotes live in San Francisco. Coyotes have dens all over the city, including in the green spaces of Bernal Heights, Golden Gate Park, Twin Peaks, McLaren Park, Lake Merced and the Presidio, which includes Crissy Field.

If You Encounter a Coyote:

- Walk away. Keep moving away from the coyote. Don't run.
- Pick up small dogs and carry them if you see a coyote.
- Do not let your dog interact with a coyote. Do not allow dogs to chase coyotes.
- Keep your dog on leash even in designated off-leash areas if coyotes are present.
- If a coyote approaches you shout, wave your arms, stomp your feet, pop open a garbage bag. The goal is to startle the coyote and encourage them to move away. It is unlawful to harass or injure coyotes.
- Carry a cane/stick, an air horn or a whistle with you on walks.
- Never let a coyote come between you and your child or pet.

Call 911 immediately if there is a crime in progress or any other emergency that requires a police, fire, or medical response. If a situation requires the police, but does not need an immediate response, call (415) 553-0123. Examples of non-emergency situations

include noise complaints, suspicious activities, or a homeless/nuisance- related issues.

If there is a problem in the park that is not an emergency, call the Park Rangers at (415) 242-6390. Use this number for park code violations, such as noise, dogs in the People Only Area, and permit violations. Park Rangers only respond to non-emergency calls. In 2003, there were 15 rangers but there are now 58 on their staff.

For problems related to maintenance issues in the park, call 311 or use the 311 app. The app allows you to take a picture of the problem. You typically receive an acknowledgement right away and then a message regarding the resolution once it has been dealt with.
